

# **Versatility & Flexibility to Perform Multiple Tasks**

**Hand Restraint** – Each hand can be extended to a maximum 14 inches, or any length in between to perform the needed task. Each hand restraint is independent of the other.



- 1. To release the hand tether, insert a standard handcuff key into the keyhole of the UniLock device.
- 2. Rotate the key, counter clockwise, 90° or until the amount of slack needed is released. Do not release a Subject's hands any further than necessary to perform the task.

The hand is fully extended, yet can be quickly retracted back to the fully restricted position by pulling on the Red tether. It is important to note – the Subject is never released from the handcuffs, ensuring security for the escorting Officer and Subject.

## **Escorting**

The SureLock Restraint System can be configured to allow the Subject restricted use of one or both hands.

If a Subject has been restrained with the Leg Restraint, adjust the slack in upper UniLock to obtain desired level of mobility.

For easier access to the leg tether, when escorting, the Officer should ideally be on the same side of the D-Ring to which the leg restraint is attached.

Maintain control of the Subject by holding onto either the Subject's arm or one of the two handles.









If the Subject starts to resist or move away, pulling up on the leg restraint will reduce mobility.

Notice the Subject's leg is now bent, limiting his stride and movement.

If the Subject is restrained and needs to take a large step up, insert the key in the upper Unilock device to release the slack.

## **Processing**

Release the hand tether to the desired length to allow a Subject the flexibility to perform

tasks such as fingerprinting, writing, drinking, giving blood or urine samples, or other functions. It is recommended that an Officer hold the red handle of the tether to quickly restrain the Subject if he becomes combative.



#### **Seating**

Subject can be seated in a vehicle or on a chair with the upper leg UniLock device adjusted to prevent the Subject from standing.

When the Subject is seated, pull on the Red Leg Restraint Tether until the Subject's foot/feet is/are pulled back to or beyond the seat legs, making approximately a 45 angle with his leg. The Subject will be unable to stand up on both legs.

To allow the Subject to stand, release the Upper UniLock to the required length of mobility.





## **Eating/Drinking**

In this example, the Subject has ease of drinking while still being fully restrained and controlled.

It is important to note, the Subject is never released from the handcuff while performing normal functions such as eating, fingerprinting, bathroom facilities, etc. This allows enough flexibility to perform the required task, yet keeps the Subject in full control by the escorting Officer.



### **Medical**



SureLock can assist Officers and treating Paramedics in a number of ways. By restraining the arms of the Subject (patient) with soft-cuffs by their sides rather than behind the back, this may allow the Subject to be seated face up and sitting upright on the ambulance stretcher.

Paramedics will be able to start an IV, take BP, pulse and blood oxygen more conveniently when compared with arms handcuffed behind the back.



Paramedics can also administer oxygen to the Subject with ease, as the neck is not strained. The chest is available for ECG, CPR or Defibrillation, if required.

At no time is the Subject "free" to carry out a serious assault on themselves or others with their hands.

Even at maximum tether, the Subject cannot effectively punch. The escorting Officer can quickly control the Subject with the aid of the handle.

If Subject becomes uncooperative or assaultive, the hand may be immediately drawn in by pulling on the Hand Restraint Tether.
